#### Scholarship in Memory of Richard H. Light

Richard H. Light, 81, passed away on Thursday, April 21, 2016, at Cornwall Manor. He was the husband of Karen R. Geesey Light. They would have celebrated their 58th wedding anniversary on June 21, 2016. Born in Lebanon, on February 4, 1935, he was the son of the late Marvin Y. and Helen B. Hershey Light.

Richard had worked as an auto mechanic in Palmyra and Jonestown. He graduated from South Lebanon High School in 1953, where he lettered in soccer, baseball and basketball.

He was a self-taught naturalist who enjoyed sharing his knowledge of the flora and fauna, particularly found in the Swatara State Park. He taught others through his slide shows, field trips, and WLBR's Talk Show. For many years Richard could be found checking his 60 bluebird boxes at GLRA, volunteering with the Ned Smith Center's sawwhet owl research project, and at the Second Mt. Hawk Watch. He participated in the Christmas Bird Counts, the Winter Raptor Survey, and the Breeding Bird Atlas.

Richard was a member of the Quittapahilla Audubon Society, Lancaster Bird Club, Entomology Club, Muhlenberg Botanical Society, Lancaster Herpetology Club, Monroe Valley Chapel, the Historic Preservation Trust, LV Conservancy, and Manada Conservancy.

He noticed and marveled at the beauty of our natural surroundings; not missing any of the incredible wonders of God's plants, birds, and animals. His gifted mind, and creative and inventive talents are missed by his family and friends.

Celebrate Richard's life by taking a walk in the woods, take two steps and then stand five minutes to observe nature. And visit Swatara State Park, sit on his Memorial Bench by the AT Bridge and enjoy the flora and fauna.

# **Lebanon Valley Conservancy Scholarship Application Check List**

Before mailing your application, check to make sure the following are also included. Include this checklist in your application package.

Completed Application Form. Use additional pages as necessary to give a ful description of your activities and employment, <u>or</u> attach resume. Photos may be included but must include at least one good facial photograph of the applicant (can be a school photo) and, if available a photo of the applicant engaged in the project or a photo of the project results.
A Written Statement submitted by the teacher or project supervisor recommending applicant.
Include an Original Essay of 2 paragraphs. The first paragraph should explain your interest in conservation, ecology, environmental sciences, etc. Please include you career goals, and any current or past community service, in any of these fields. The second paragraph should explain why you think you qualify for this scholarship and the project description.

Questions to be considered in the essay:

- Who initiated the project? Teacher? Project Leader? Self?
- Participants? Number and Project leader?
- Long-Term Impact?

### FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

1. What are the eligibility requirements for this scholarship?

There are two conditions to be met for eligibility. The first is that the graduating high school student be a resident of the Lebanon Valley; the second is that the field of study chosen is within the fields of conservation, ecology, natural resources/wildlife management, water resources and management, and the environmental sciences and has completed a conservation/environmental project.

2. What is the scholarship value?

The scholarship is \$1000.

3. When will I know if I am awarded this scholarship?

If your school has an awards ceremony, you will receive a certificate at that time. Additionally, your school counseling office will be notified before your graduation date or LV Conservancy will notify you.

4. If I am awarded this scholarship, when will I receive the money?

LV Conservancy will distribute upon recipient's high school graduation generally at the LV Conservancy May board meeting.

5. The application form asks my post secondary plans. If I do not get accepted there, or if I choose to attend another school, will I still be eligible for the scholarship money should I be selected?

As long as your intent is to study conservation, ecology, natural resources/wildlife management, water resources and management, or the environmental sciences, you are still eligible to receive your award.

6. Are there any other requirements?

The LV Conservancy requires that within one year of receipt of the scholarship, the recipient sends a letter apprising of your current progress in your field.
